Audrey Calderwood, MD

Associate Professor of Medicine at the Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Clinical Practice, Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center Lebanon, New Hampshire

Dr. Calderwood is an Associate Professor of Medicine at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and the Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Clinical Practice. Quality has been an overarching theme throughout her career. She is passionate about risk-aligned care, such that high-risk patients receive appropriate and timely care and that low risk patients avoid unnecessary procedures. She validated, disseminated and educated providers on the Boston Bowel Preparation Scale during her NIH Career Development Award. Her current NCI-funded R21 grant to optimize use of surveillance colonoscopy in older adults. At the national level, she continues to be highly engaged with the ASGE.

Doug Corley, MD, PhD

Research Scientist, Gastroenterologist at Kaiser Permanente Northern California, Associate Clinical Professor at UCSF

Douglas Corley, MD, PhD is a research scientist and practicing gastroenterologist at Kaiser Permanente Northern California and a Clinical Professor at UCSF. He is a past member of the American Gastroenterological Association's Clinical Practice and Quality Management committee and the lead investigator on a multi-institution NCI center grant that is evaluating the colorectal cancer screening process, including quality metrics. His research includes the evaluation of gastroesophageal reflux disease, quality and effectiveness measures for GI cancer screening, the evaluation of adverse impacts of medical interventions (including pharmacotherapy), and the development of methods for evaluating outcomes from electronic data sources.

Johannes Koch, MD

Gastroenterologist at Virginia Mason Medical Center Seattle, WA

Dr. Koch joined Virginia Mason Medical Center nine years ago with a special interest in quality and outcome measures after receiving his MBA from Columbia University. At Virginia Mason, in addition to maintaining an active clinical practice, he is spearheading efforts to evaluate and enhance internal outcome metrics used to help the GI Section maintain its high international

reputation. In conjunction with the four other core members of the Center for Healthcare Solutions, he works to continue to develop clinical value streams for the most common health related concerns, which serve as models for a market-based collaborative, an association of large businesses, insurers, and other provider organizations. These value streams are designed to deliver rapid access to standardized, evidence-based patient care that reliably delivers high patient satisfaction, rapid return to function, and reduce costs. Dr. Koch graduated AOA from Tulane and completed his residency, fellowship and previously served 8 years on faculty at UCSF.

Larissa Temple, MD

Dr. Larissa Temple is a colorectal surgeon at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. She is an Associate Professor of Surgery and Director of the colorectal survivorship clinic. Dr. Temple is an active member of the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons and co-chairs the Quality and Safety Committee.

Brian Jacobson, MD

Brian C. Jacobson, MD, MPH has been a practicing gastroenterologist for more than 17 years, specializing in endoscopic procedures. He developed one of the most commonly used rating scales for describing colonoscopy bowel preparation and helped establish the quality standards currently used to asses providers who perform colonoscopy. He is also the medical director of a large Accountable Care Organization and has detailed knowledge about clinician-level cost and resource use measures. He has served on two National Quality Forum Technical Advisory Panels and on the Governing Board of the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy.
