Thomas K. McInerny, MD, FAAP, President of the American Academy of Pediatrics, is the Associate Chair for Clinical Affairs and Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Rochester Medical Center/Golisano Children's Hospital. Dr. McInerny is a graduate of Dartmouth College, Dartmouth Medical School, and Harvard Medical School. His pediatric residency training was at Cincinnati and Boston Children's Hospitals. Prior to joining Northeastern, Auerbach was the Commissioner of Public Health for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts from 2007 to 2012. In this capacity one of his responsibilities was the oversight of the HIV/AIDS office and the Bureau of Infectious Disease Prevention and Control. Under his leadership the Department developed new and innovative programs to address racial and ethnic disparities, to promote wellness (including the Mass in Motion campaign), to combat chronic disease and to support the successful implementation of the state's health care reform initiative. From 2010-2011, Auerbach also served as President for the Association of State and Territories Health Officials (ASTHO). Prior to his appointment as Commissioner, Auerbach had been the Executive Director of the Boston Public Health Commission for 9 years. He led a department of 1,200 employees including the HIV/AIDS section. He had previously worked at the State Health Department for a decade, first as the Chief of Staff and later as an Assistant Commissioner overseeing the HIV/AIDS Bureau.
