R. Sean Morrison, MD

Co-Director, Patty and Jay Baker National Palliative Care Center; Director, National Palliative Care Research Center; Director, Hertzberg Palliative Care Institute, Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai

Dr. Morrison has served on the MAP Hospital Workgroup since 2011. He has extensive knowledge of quality measurement and the nine different federal hospital and setting-specific quality programs. He is a demonstrated leader in the field of palliative medicine, both providing direct care to patients and spearheading countless national research initiatives to expand the evidence-base and ensure that findings are rapidly translated into clinical practice. This research includes pain and symptom management in high-risk and medically underserved populations, decision making at the end of life, and quality measures in palliative care. Most recently, Dr. Morrison's research has focused on improving the management of pain in older adults and on developing and evaluating models of palliative care delivery in hospitals and the community. Outside of MAP, he has chaired numerous task forces and committees, both nationally and internationally, and served as the President of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine. Dr. Morrison's CV demonstrates his vast experience directing and conducting research, and reporting findings back to a number of federal entities including NIH and HHS.

Deborah Waldrop, Ph.D, LMSW, ACSW

Professor, University of Buffalo, School of Social Work Buffalo, New York

Deborah Waldrop, LMSW, PhD is a Professor and the Associate Dean for Faculty Development at the University at Buffalo School of Social Work (UBSSW). Deborah joined the UBSSW faculty after spending 20 years as a social worker in a variety of healthcare settings including hospice. Drawing from the experiences of older adults and their families Dr. Waldrop conducts research about the needs and concerns that emerge at life's end, means for improving advance care planning and caregivers' adaptation in bereavement. Deborah participated as a member of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine's Measuring what Matters initiative.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Bob Archuleta, MD

Physician, Pediatric Associates Midlothian, Virginia

Dr. Archuleta received his undergraduate degree in political science from the University of Wyoming in 1971 and his medical degree from the University of Colorado in 1975. He performed his internship and residency in pediatrics at William Beaumont Army Medical Center in El Paso, Texas. Then he served as Chief of Pediatrics at Fort Lee, Virginia for two years before entering into private practice. He has been a primary care pediatrician in private practice in Richmond, Virginia for 37 years. He has been married to Felice M. Archuleta, M.D. for 37 years and they have a 32 year old son, Henry, and a 25 year old daughter, Christine.

Dr. Archuleta became active in hospice and palliative care because as a practicing pediatrician his greatest challenge was in helping children and families who face life-limiting illness and children who grieve the loss of a loved one. He founded Noah's Children in 1997 to address the deficiency in addressing the needs of children with life-threatening and life-limiting illness.

Dr. Archuleta has served as Medical Director of the Noah's Children Hospice and Palliative Care Program since it was licensed. In October, 1999 he was presented the President's Award from the Virginia Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics "for his vision, dreams and dedication as the founder of Noah's Children, serving the needs of special children and their families in his community."

In 2000, the Richmond Academy of Medicine Board of Trustees presented Dr. Archuleta with the Distinguished Service Award for Ministry to Children "In grateful appreciation for your courage and commitment to the children and families of Metropolitan Richmond for whom you created Noah's Children so that every child has a safe and comforting haven for their journeys."

In 2004 Dr. Archuleta received his board certification from the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine, making him the 18th pediatricians in the country to be board certified in both pediatrics and hospice & palliative medicine. He was again board certified by the ABMS in Hospice and Palliative Medicine in 2012. In 2014, Dr. Archuleta was honored to become a Fellow of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine.

Dr. Archuleta served as the Bundy Professor and Chair of Community Pediatrics for VCU from 2003 to 2005. During that time he chaired a task force that developed a hospital-based pediatric palliative care and pain management program for the VCU Department of Pediatrics and then served as medical director of the program from 2005 to 2007.

Dr. Archuleta practices full-time general pediatrics in Richmond. He continues to serve as Medical Director of Noah's Children, now that Noah's Children is a community outreach program of the Bon Secours Health System.

Margie Atkinson, D. Min, BCC

Director, Pastoral Care, Ethics and Palliative Care, Morton Plant Mease/Bay Care Health System Palm Harbor, Florida

Dr. Margie Atkinson is the Director of Pastoral Care, Ethics and Palliative Care programs for Morton Plant Mease Healthcare, part of BayCare Health System in the Tampa Bay Area of Florida. Atkinson's expertise includes pastoral and spiritual care, and administration in multiple settings, including hospice, acute care and children's hospital settings. Atkinson currently oversees the

spiritual care and palliative care services for four acute care hospitals and one LTACH in the Tampa Bay area. She implemented a clinical pastoral education program in BayCare Health System and has been instrumental in developing palliative care in two health systems. She currently co-leads the 13-hospital system's palliative care collaborative, a group consisting of leadership from across the system.

Amy J. Berman, BSN

Senior Program Officer, John A. Hartford Foundation New York, New York

Amy Berman, a senior program officer with The John A. Hartford Foundation, is best known for publicly sharing her experiences living with Stage IV breast cancer. She authored pieces on value in health care decisions, palliative care, and implications for patients, practice and policy. Her piece in Health Affairs, Living Life In My Own Way—And Dying That Way As Well, was among the most read in the history of the journal. At the John A. Hartford Foundation, Ms. Berman, a nurse, leads the Foundation's investments in models of care that improve health of older adults including palliative care. Ms. Berman is the recipient of numerous honors for advocacy on behalf of those facing serious illness including the Presidential Citation from AAHPM.

Eduardo Bruera, MD

Professor and Chair, Department of Palliative, Rehabilitation and Integrative Medicine, University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center Houston, Texas

Dr. Bruera trained in medical oncology, and is board certified in Hospice and Palliative Medicine. In 1999, he joined The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center where he holds the F.T. McGraw Chair in the Treatment of Cancer, and is Chair of the Department of Palliative, Rehabilitation and Integrative Medicine.

Dr. Bruera developed and led the Edmonton Regional and Palliative Care program in Canada. He has conducted and published many research studies, with 1000+ publications and 900 lectures. Dr. Bruera has participated actively in quality initiatives with MD Anderson, the National Quality Forum, ASCO, and IOM.

Cleanne Cass, DO, FAAHPM, FAAFP is the Director of Community Care and Education, Hospice of Dayton, heading in-home patient services and education for medical students, residents and fellows in Hospice and Palliative Medicine.

Dr. Cass is an appointed member of the Ohio Governor's Cabinet Opioid Action team developing guidelines for safe opioid prescribing. She is also a member of the state task force working toward implementation of MOLST (Medical Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment).

Michelle Caughey, MD, FACP is Associate Executive Director of The Permanente Medical Group. She previously served as Physician-in-Chief at KP South San Francisco (SSF) from 1997 to 2011. A native of the Philadelphia area, she earned her undergraduate degree at Wellesley and her medical degree at Stanford, then completed Internal Medicine training at Pennsylvania Hospital.

In 1986 she developed a Hospice Program at SSF and served as its Medical Director for many years before moving into administration. In her regional role, she oversaw the initiation of Life Care Planning, and continues responsibility for Palliative and End-of-Life Care for Northern California.

Rev. Handzo is widely regarded as a leading international authority on the practice of professional healthcare chaplaincy. He participated in the development of the Systems of Belief Inventory (SBI). He led the effort that created North American standards for the certification of chaplains, and is currently leading the development of the first set of measurable outcomes for healthcare chaplaincy. Rev. Handzo has been part of two national and one international interdisciplinary consensus conferences developing models and goals for the integration of spiritual care in healthcare and is a member of the Global Network for Spirituality and Health leadership team.

Dr. Arif Kamal is the Physician Quality and Outcomes Officer for the Duke Cancer Institute, with dual appointments in the Division of Medical Oncology and Section of Palliative Care at Duke University. Alice R. Lind is Manager, Grants and Program Development, in the Washington State Health Care Authority. Her staff is responsible for the development, implementation, and evaluation of innovative Medicaid programs.

Formerly, Ms. Lind was the Senior Clinical Officer at the Center for Health Care Strategies (CHCS). There, she provided technical assistance to many states around the country in designing systems of care for high-need, high-cost populations, with a special emphasis on those who are dually eligible for Medicaid and Medicare. She has authored several papers on performance
