Re: Patient Safety Fall 2020 Technical Report

### Background

This report reflects the review of measures in the Patient Safety project. Measures in this portfolio focus on medication safety, healthcare-associated infection, falls, pressure ulcers, and other safety concerns. Measures in this review cycle focused on medication safety as it relates to older adults and post-discharge medication reconciliation. Also reviewed were measures that assess mortality rates following hospitalization for pneumonia and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, as well as a composite measure that encompasses a series of hospital level-quality indicators as it relates to potentially preventable hospital-related events associated with harmful outcomes for patients.

The 25-person Patient Safety Standing Committee reviewed six measures. Four were recommended for endorsement, one was not recommended for endorsement, and the Standing Committee did not reach consensus for the remaining measure.
