John James, PhD Founder, Patient Safety America Houston, TX

Dr. John James is a patient safety activist who founded Patient Safety America with the goal of educating the public on the dangers of American healthcare delivery. Dr. James has published two books on patient safety and a seminal article in the *Journal of Patient Safety* (2013) that redefined the extent of harm associated with hospital care. Dr. James has spoken to groups to include physicians, medical students, nurses, nursing students and educators, retiree groups, etc., and he aims to represent the voice of an informed patient when it comes to patient safety and engagement.

Geeta Sood, MD, ScM

The Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America Baltimore, MD

Dr. Geeta Sood is an infectious disease physician who completed her medical training at Temple University and her epidemiology training at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She has served as a hospital epidemiologist for 11 years. In addition, Dr. Pollak helped revise the National Patient Safety Goals and revised the Sentinel Event Policy to make it more aligned to current quality and safety concerns. Dr. Pollak was a core member of TJC's National Patient Safety Collaborative, partnering with the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI), the Institute for Safe Medication Practices (ISMP), and ECRI.

Jamie Roney is a nurse leader dedicated to patient safety and quality care. Her nursing career includes service to our country in the U.S. Army Reserve. Previously, Dr. Seidenwurm had been a neuroradiologist with Radiological Associates of Sacramento since 1991 and the past Chairman of the Diagnostic Radiology Division, which comprised 43 radiologists covering five hospital radiology departments and 12 independent imaging facilities. He was also President of California Managed Imaging, a statewide diagnostic imaging network.

Dr. David Stockwell is a patient safety researcher whose research focuses on systematic, reliable identification of patient safety events, having authored numerous publications on this topic. He has served on several national efforts to advance quality and patient safety. Currently, he also serves as Director of Safety Quality and Logistics in the Pediatric ICU at the Johns Hopkins Children's Center in addition to his role as Chief Medical Officer (CMO) for Pascal Metrics, a patient safety organization. Dr. Stockwell earned his doctor of medicine from the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine and holds an MBA from George Washington University. He is board certified in pediatrics and pediatric critical care.

Iona Thraen, PhD, ACSW

Dr. Donald Yealy has led trials with over \$25 million of federal funding and authored over 300 manuscripts, texts, etc. He is a leader in hospital and health system quality efforts; optimal airway management in acute respiratory failure; predictive risk modeling in pneumonia, heart failure, and pulmonary embolism; and subsequent translation to practice. His expert input in sepsis influenced the most recent NQF-endorsed measure #0500 and CMS sepsis-1 quality efforts. Themes of his work include the following: How can we improve the assessment and treatment of acute illness? Dr. Yealy leads faculty delivering care to over 950,000 patients at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center and the University of Pittsburgh.

Yanling Yu, PhD

Physical Oceanographer and Patient Safety Advocate, Washington Advocate for Patient Safety Seattle, WA

Dr. Yanling Yu is a physical oceanographer and patient safety advocate. Before her retirement from the University of Washington, she researched polar sea ice and its changes in response to climate change. However, her professional path took a sharp turn after her father tragically died due to preventable medical harm caused by the negligent use of an off-label medication. Now, Dr. Yu is actively involved with various patient safety issues at the state and national levels. As a patient safety advocate, she promotes hospital care and medication safety, healthcare accountability and transparency, patient rights to informed consent and shared decision making, and patient- and family-centered care. In 2011, she and her husband Rex Johnson worked with state legislators to successfully pass a medical board

transparency bill in Washington state. Dr. Yu will continue to be a voice for patients and families, including those who no longer have voices.
