Radiologist/Pediatric Radiologist & Director of Practice Quality Improvement in Radiology, Emory University

Kimberly Applegate, MD, MS, FACR is a professor of radiology and pediatrics and director of practice quality improvement in radiology at Emory University in Atlanta. At Emory University, she chairs the Radiation Control Council which reviews policy, clinical, and research activities involving the use of ionizing radiation. Kimberly is dedicated to service in organized radiology—she is the President of the Association for University Radiologists (AUR) Research and Education Foundation, Past President of the AUR, and served on multiple medical boards and editorial boards. In 2010, she coedited the book "Evidence-Based Imaging in Pediatrics" to promote appropriate use of medical imaging in infants and children. Most recently, she has co-authored the ICRP Publication 121: Radiological Protection of Paediatric Diagnostic and Interventional Radiology. She has long had an interest in the development of imaging guidelines, chairing this process for the ACR, and collaborating with the WHO and IAEA on international guideline development. Dr. Applegate is the ACR Vice Speaker and member of its Executive Committee.

In 2011 she and her husband Rex Johnson worked with state legislators and got a medical board transparency bill passed in Washington State. She will continue to be the voice for patients and families including those who have no voices anymore.
