Kaye Bender, PhD, RN, FAAN Public Health Accreditation Board Alexandria, VA

Kaye Bender, PhD, RN, FAAN, is the President and CEO of the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB), a position she has held since 2009. Prior to coming to PHAB, she worked in both local and state public health practice in the Mississippi State Department of Health. Her last position there, for 12 years, was Deputy State Health Officer. She served as Dean of the University of Mississippi Medical School of Nursing and Associate Vice Chancellor for Nursing for six years. She is still a Professor on that campus and teaches three graduate/doctoral online courses per year for both the School of Nursing and the School of Health Related Professions. Dr. Bender chaired the Exploring Accreditation Steering Committee, the precursor study for the establishment of the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB), funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Public Health Accreditation Board is the national accrediting body for state, local, tribal and territorial health departments in the United States. She served on three Institute of Medicine study committees related to public health and an IOM standing committee on credentialing research in nursing. She also serves on the National Board of Public Health Examiners; is an active member of the American Public Health Association and is a fellow in the American Academy of Nursing. She was inducted into the MS Nurses Hall of Fame in 2013. She has numerous publications related to governmental public health systems improvement, and has received a number of awards and recognitions both in nursing and in public health.

Steven M. Teutsch, MD, MPH

Steven M. Teutsch, MD, MPH, is the Adjunct Professor, UCLA Fielding School of Public Health and the former Chief Science Officer of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health as of February 2009. Georges C. Benjamin, MD, MACP, FACEP, is well-known in the world of public health as a leader, practitioner and administrator. He was promoted to Acting Commissioner for Public Health for the District of Columbia and later directed one of the busiest ambulance services in the nation. In 2008 and 2014, he was named one of the top 25 minority executives in health care by Modern Healthcare Magazine, in addition to being voted among the 100 most influential people in health care from 2007 through 2014 and one of the nation's most influential physician executives from 2009 to 2014.

Scott D. Berns, MD, MPH, FAAP

Scott D. Berns, MD, MPH, FAAP is President and CEO of the NICHQ (National Institute for Children's Health Quality), an independent, nonprofit organization working for nearly two decades to improve children's health. NICHQ helps organizations and professionals who share this mission make breakthrough improvements so children and families can live healthier lives. Berns joined NICHQ in October 2015 after serving for 14 years at the March of Dimes National Office, where he was the Senior Vice President of Chapter Programs and Deputy Medical Officer. There he provided direction in education and community services to all March of Dimes state-based chapters, including DC and Puerto Rico. Berns directed national initiatives that are implemented in communities, such as family support and professional development in the newborn intensive care unit (NICU), Mobile Health Care, and Healthy Babies Are Worth the Wait[®]. He is Editor and Co-Author of "Toward Improving the Outcome of Pregnancy III: Enhancing Perinatal Health Through Quality, Safety and Performance Initiatives". Berns is a board certified pediatrician and pediatric emergency physician. He is a Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University and Clinical Professor of Health Services, Policy and Practice at the Brown School of Public Health in Providence, RI. He formerly held the post of Medical Director of Pediatric Trauma at Hasbro Children's Hospital in Providence, RI for 7 years. Berns is also a co-founder of The Progeria Research Foundation, Inc., and serves as its Chairman of the Board. Berns received his bachelor's and medical degrees from Boston University. He completed his residency in pediatrics at Rhode Island Hospital and completed a fellowship in pediatric emergency medicine at Children's National Medical Center in Washington, DC. Berns earned a masters of public health from the Harvard School of Public Health with a concentration in health, policy and management. Berns also completed a one-year White House Fellowship where he served as a Special Assistant to the U.S. Secretary of Transportation. Berns has made multiple media appearances as an expert in perinatal health; his son Sam and family were featured in an HBO Emmy Award-winning documentary titled "Life According to Sam". He has received the Willis Wingert Award for excellence in research in pediatric emergency medicine from the American Academy of Pediatrics, a national award from the National Perinatal Association, a public health service award from the U.S. Department of Transportation, and the 2015 Impact Award from the White House Fellows Foundation & Association.

Christina Bethell, PhD, MBA, MPH

Dr. Bethell is a Professor in the Bloomberg School of Public Health at Johns Hopkins University, where she serves as the founding director of the Child and Adolescent Health Measurement Initiative (CAHMI) within the Department of Population, Family and Reproductive Health. She is passionate about enabling data-driven partnerships and leveraging the new brain sciences, mindfulness and other mind-body methods to transform health and related services, with a focus on addressing childhood trauma, promoting positive health and advancing High Reliability Organizations.
